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## INTRODUCTION EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The USC Arts & Climate Collective (ACC) empowers students to use arts and storytelling as mediums to address diverse issues within sustainability, including environmental justice, climate change, health and wellness, and more. By providing funding and guidance, uplifting creative work, and building community within and beyond the USC campus, the ACC drives shared commitment around sustainability and develops essential mindsets and skills that prepare students for long-term success in their creative, professional, and advocacy endeavors.

Since its launch as a pilot in Spring 2021, the ACC has developed into a robust organization with an annual award program and an ever-evolving slate of programming and community-building functions for awardees and the extended USC community. The program's primary goals are empowering creativity, building community, and inspiring action around diverse issues within sustainability.

In just three years, the ACC has distributed \$103,950 in awards to over 77 student artistactivists and their projects. These students range from first year through doctoral students and have come from 18 of USC's 23 schools. Their projects include mediums ranging from film to music composition to interactive games to installations, and this report features a number of exceptional student projects that embody the diversity of award recipients and their initiatives. The ACC has put on a number of events which have now become annual staples in the USC community, including a student film festival and an Earth Month Festival and Resource Fair, each bringing in hundreds of attendees. In addition, the ACC hosts panel discussions, art-makings, project showcases, and more.

The ACC is a collaboration among the <u>Presidential Working Group on Sustainability</u> (from which the ACC originated), the USC Office of Sustainability, the <u>USC Annenberg Innovation</u> <u>Lab</u>, <u>USC Arts In Action</u>, and the <u>USC Fisher</u> <u>Museum of Art</u>. The ACC receives modest institutional funding and supplements it with philanthropy, internal grants, and research funds to support its awards and programming. Its organizing team is composed of students, staff, and faculty from across campus, with an emphasis on interdisciplinary collaboration.

This report comprises a review of the ACC's work from 2021 - 2024, including the impact it has achieved and the communities it has reached. With additional financial support the ACC can increase its capacity to develop and uplift a growing community of sustainability-focused artists and storytellers.

#### GOALS

## **MISSION STATEMENT**

The ACC empowers students to use arts and storytelling as mediums to address issues of environmental justice, climate change, and sustainability. By providing funding and guidance, uplifting creative work, and building community within and beyond the USC campus, the ACC drives shared commitment around sustainability, and develops essential mindsets and skills that prepare students for long-term success in their creative, professional, and advocacy endeavors. Our primary goals are empowering creativity, building community, and inspiring action.

## GOAL #1 EMPOWERING CREATIVITY

The ACC empowers student creativity through its annual award program in which it supports students with funding to develop their own art, media, and culture projects to address the issues sustainability that are most important to them. The ACC further supports awardees in their creative endeavors by providing mentorship, resources, and a community of creative thinkers and doers. Unlike classroom most assignments and work deliverables, ACC awards are opportunities for students to design and execute their own creative visions in a free and low-consequence environment, focusing on the journey more than the final product to nurture exploration and creativity. The ACC aims to motivate and equip participants with the confidence to imagine, develop, and realize their goals.

Reaching beyond its awardees, the ACC strives to engage all participants in an artistic or creative element at each of its events. Art-making has countless – and increasingly well-documented – positive psychological and physiological benefits. The ACC seeks to remind participants that we are all artists, and there is power in creativity.

## **BUILDING COMMUNITY**

Many students and faculty have emphasized the ACC's uniqueness in the way that it facilitates connection across academic disciplines and art forms, providing an opportunity to merge interests and passions which are often siloed.

To achieve this, the ACC hosts programming for both targeted small groups as well as the entire campus and public. Frequent in-person activities are geared towards relationship building among members of annual student cohorts, aiming to develop personal and professional networks while supporting belonging. In order to reach across and beyond the university, the ACC has developed unique events that are open to all and have grown to attract audiences of 400+ students, staff, faculty, and community members. ## **INSPIRING ACTION**

Recognizing the imperative of making real progress on climate issues, ACC programming is also designed to encourage action. Events foster shared learning about environmental issues, arts, and activism through panels of experts and leaders, engaging activities and discussions. and interactions with community members to foster inspiration, ideation, and action. Resource fairs involving community partners enable attendees to connect interest and passion with avenues for progress. Taken collectively, the ACC is build a social movement around helping to environmental justice and sustainability at USC that leverages cultural strategies as catalysts for change and creates a nurturing community of practice that supports student confidence and capacity for action.




## AWARDEES

#### The ACC's first four cohorts of awardees from 2021 to 2023 included 68 students.

Looking ahead, the ACC aspires both to continue to increase the ambition of our programs and opportunities and to promote them even more broadly. Expanding outreach with more targeted informational sessions and tailored recruitment campaigns holds the potential elevate fresh perspectives to and emerging creatives - especially from underrepresented communities and disciplines that are often more disconnected from the arts. Meaningfully including and serving these groups will also necessarily inform ACC's approach to awards and programming overall.

## PROJECTS

The ACC supports student projects that reflect a unique blend of creativity with social and environmental advocacy. Each year's applicant pool showcases innovative, interdisciplinary responses to climate justice issues. From film and digital media to fine arts and emerging fields such as gaming, the mediums employed by awardees reflect the importance of nuanced and intersectional approaches to wider calls for sustainability.

Within ACC cohort projects, environmental justice has emerged as a predominant theme. There has also been a collective emphasis on health through both physical and mental lenses, highlighting the intersectionality of environmental issues and human well-being. Areas of focus, preferred media, and other aspects of the projects continue to vary over time, giving us unique windows into the dynamism of student thinking and experience.

## PROJECTS



**51 MILES** 

Students Leslie Dinkin, Hannah Flynn, and Nina Weithorn partnered with Camille Shooshani, filmmaker and USC alum, to capture their multiday, fifty-one mile journey of walking the LA River. The team documented and indexed the Los Angeles River's current conditions with a particular focus on arts, culture, human access, and experience of an ecological industrial landscape through mapping, photography, film, and narrative ethnography.

While the ACC was the first grant this group received, it was far from the last, and the project continues to grow. It has garnered attention from organizations like <u>KCRW</u>, <u>LAist</u>, <u>Engineering with Nature</u>, <u>USC Arts in Action</u>, <u>Save As: NextGen Heritage</u> <u>Conservation</u>, the Landscape Architecture Foundation, and the American Society of Landscape Architecture. The team is currently working on the film and a book, while exploring other rivers.



### THE RESILIENCE PROJECT

The Resilience Project united USC composers, musicians, dancers, and storytellers to engage audiences not only on the scope of sustainability challenges but also around tangible solutions. The project broke down the overwhelming climate crisis in a digestible and engaging way through spoken word poetry that informed choreographic interpretations. It was accompanied by a world premiere from student composer Quenton Blache, performed by student musicians Cam Audras and Elise Haukenes.

## FASHION & SUSTAINABILITY

This project by Paola Espinosa focused on the production of sustainable textiles. Paola's research delved into the symbiotic relationship between humans and their environment, viewing the environment as a catalyst for successful change and the re-innovation of design. By cultures that have historically examining integrated themselves with nature through earthbased design, she created an opportunity to compare the industrialized Western lifestyle with more these cultures, further exploring a ecologically responsive way of living. A key part of Paola's research is her ongoing project of developing a biotextile made from food waste for use in clothing.

## **DESEO Y DISEÑO**

Deseo y Diseño is a video game created by siblings Michael and Sol Lagos. In the video game, players step into the shoes of a native Angeleno and Raspadero (shaved ice vendor) as they explore a radical reimagining of Los Angeles through sustainable architectural redesign and queer imagination. The project balances speculative ideas with practical impacts on the built environment, envisioning a redesign of public institutions alongside a fictional narrative. The exhibition invited viewers to engage with this reimagined L.A., encouraging them to envision their place in the city's future.

## ECO ALARM

Eco Alarm is a student-run podcast that shares the stories of environmental change-makers and their success in the USC and greater Los Angeles community. The podcast team was part of the ACC's inaugural cohort and has released 26 episodes to date, seamlessly navigating the challenge of leadership transition over time.




## PROGRAMMING

The ACC hosts a range of events throughout the school year to engage USC and the wider Los Angeles community in exploring sustainability and environmental activism through art. The ACC's recurring annual programming slate features three central events: Regenerate, the Eco Film + Media Arts Festival, and the ACC Earth Month Festival. Together, these events elevate dozens of artist-activists and bring together over 600 students and community members annually.

## REGENERATE

A community-building event to regenerate through art-making, local food, and a speaker series on issues including environmental justice and creativity

Regenerate provides a reinvigorating experience for participants who may feel overwhelmed or burnt out by the challenges of climate change. Attendees are welcomed to the USC Fisher Museum of Art for an evening of discussion and art-making centered on environmental justice and facilitated by local activists and community leaders. Regenerate offers participants renewed energy and the opportunity to create a shared vision for a sustainable future by fostering community, hope, and inspiration.









#### **2021**

Local activists <u>Nalleli Cobo</u>, winner of the Goldman Environmental Prize, and Hugo Garcia from <u>People Not Pozos</u> joined USC Environmental Health Professor Jill Johnston and Tianna Shaw-Wakeman, climate activist and USC's first Black valedictorian, to highlight critical intersections between environmental justice and public health, a theme that would become a mainstay for future iterations.

## REGENERATE

#### 2022

USC professor and urban pop artist Eric Junker led a Protest Poster art workshop. This immersive workshop was followed by a panel conversation facilitated by China Adams with ACC awardees, aimed at illuminating the intersection of arts and activism and encouraging collaborative efforts toward environmental sustainability on campus.

#### 2023

USC professor and artist China Adams guided attendees in a collaborative collage-making session around envisioning a sustainable future. Complementing this, a panel facilitated by Arts in Action student coordinator Seanna Latiff included community leader Johvanna Ordonez from Legacy. LA, and USC Professors Henry Jenkins (<u>The Civic</u> <u>Imagination Project</u>) and Rob McConnell (<u>USC</u> <u>Center for Children's Environmental Health</u>) provided insights into the ACC's theme for 2023: "How would you reimagine Los Angeles?"

## ECO FILM + MEDIA ARTS FEST

A collaboration between the ACC and the USC School of Cinematic Arts' Department of Media Arts and Practice

The Eco Film + Media Arts Festival provides an opportunity for ACC awardees and other student filmmakers to screen their original films in front of a live audience of peers and industry professionals. Significantly, the Eco Film + Media Arts Festival is the first time many of the student filmmakers have debuted their work in front of a large audience.







This event began as the idea of an ACC awardee and has been a student-led endeavor ever since. In 2023, the festival received <u>the Campus</u> <u>Sustainability Student Leadership Award</u> from the <u>Association for the Advancement of Sustainability</u> <u>in Higher Education</u> in recognition of exceptional student leadership in creating a platform for students to showcase their work and engage with a broader audience on pressing environmental issues.

The 21 films featured across the two festivals thus far have documented social movements, elevated stories of communities banding together against environmental threats from pollution to invasive fish, and much more.

## ECO FILM + MEDIA ARTS FEST

The Eco Film Festival also hosts eco-storytelling panels, which have featured Shawn Sweeney (Jane Goodall Institute), Marlee Fox (Universal Television), Paula Cizmar (USC School of Dramatic Arts), and Courtnee Zambrano (Apple TV's Extrapolations).

To further develop this event, we added two cash prizes for excellence in environmental filmmaking and a networking mixer to the 2024 festival.

The 2025 Eco Film + Media Arts Festival will mark the first time student filmmakers from schools across Los Angeles are invited to submit their work, potentially making it the only intercollegiate environmental film festival in the city.

## ACC EARTH MONTH FESTIVAL

A student project showcase and celebration of diverse groups working to create a sustainable future

Our largest event, the annual Earth Month Festival, features a resource fair with Los Angeles and USC-based organizations, art activations, and workshops, as well as a student art showcase. This event unites art, activism, and community through a myriad of activities. Performance arts from live bands to interpretive dances draw excited crowds, community-led workshops engage attendees in collaborative art pieces, and the resource fair connects guests to opportunities, programs, and community organizations.





Roughly 400 students, staff, faculty, and community members attend this event each year, which creates ample opportunities for attendees and organizations to learn about the work of others, explore possible collaborations, network, and connect with new opportunities. At the 2024 festival, 13 ACC awardees showcased their projects and 24 community and/or campus groups were featured within the resource fair. Every year, attendees leave inspired by the passionate energy and ideas of their peers who are helping create a more sustainable future.

## ADDITIONAL PROGRAMMING

## BE THE REVOLUTION

The ACC collaborated with Jay Ponti – a grassroots political organizer who participated in Occupy Wall Street, Standing Rock, and Bernie Sanders' two presidential campaigns – on the "<u>Be the Revolution</u>" workshop to offer USC community members new skills in changemaking, community organizing, and serving as allies to Native American activists. Attendees learned to prioritize self-care, build movements, and achieve goals for organizations and social movements alike.

## MURAL Contest

The ACC facilitated a contest in Fall 2023 to spotlight student art within USC's brand new Sustainability Hub and the <u>USC Peace Garden</u>. The ACC selected five different murals to fund and display in the Hub on a rotating basis, sparking conversations around climate futures and sustainability from student perspectives.

## ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

In 2021, the unlikely trifecta of a USC faculty member, staff member, and student created the ACC and worked together with a variety of great partners to launch the organization's first round of awards. To this day, the ACC has maintained strong involvement of faculty, staff, and students, as well as a collaborative structure in which student workers, staff, and faculty are all equal leaders.

The core ACC leadership team includes a faculty member, three staff members (each from different departments), and three to four student workers. Additionally, students, staff, and faculty from across the university who demonstrate interest in the ACC are welcomed to join the organizing team and participate in any way that fits with their interests. This open-door culture allows the ACC to grow and develop and further build community across campus.

ACC student workers are encouraged to take strong leadership roles throughout all facets of the organization. Students serve as event leads, manage outreach initiatives, design the website, represent the organization, manage internal and external communications, engage in programming, and are a critical part of determining the goals of the organization as well as the tools used to achieve them.

# FUNDING

When the ACC launched as a pilot in Spring 2021, it pulled together \$15,000 from a variety of sources across the USC campus to give out its first round of awards, and all faculty, staff, and student work was on a volunteer basis. The ACC has since become more institutionalized, with all student workers paid, and a majority of funding coming from the formal university budget process. The ACC seeks to expand opportunities by forming creative partnerships - for example, in 2023, the Center for Southern California Children's Environmental Health Research Translation and Environmental Justice Lab invested \$15,000 to create the ACC's first-ever themed awards, inviting applicants to imagine a healthy, inclusive, and sustainable Los Angeles.

There is significant potential to expand the scope and impact of the ACC with additional funding, and the organizing team looks forward to discussing ideas with any groups who are interested in collaborating.
